*Sex tourism*: travel for the purpose of purchasing sex

*The Swedish Model:* criminalizes the buying, rather than the selling, of sexual services<sup>1</sup> Adopted by Sweden, France, Norway, Iceland, and Northern Ireland

### Methods of Trafficking

**Deception and Debt Bondage:** Victims hear of promising job opportunities abroad and are told someone will help them with travel arrangements, but once in the destination country, their passport and legal documents are taken from them and they are told they must work to pay back their travel debt.

*'Love Boy' Method:* Mostly young girls are pursued by older boys or men and develop a relationship. The man suggests moving in together or traveling abroad for job opportunities, which the woman agrees to. Over time, the man becomes increasingly controlling and eventually pressures, forces, or sells the woman into prostitution.

### Common Types of Trafficking

#### Sex Trafficking

Trafficking of persons for the purpose of sexual exploitation, which can include prostitution, pornography, or other sexual services

Estimated 69% of reported cases in Europe<sup>2</sup>

#### Labor Trafficking

Trafficking of persons for the purpose of labor exploitation Estimated 19% of reported cases in Europe<sup>3</sup>

#### Child Trafficking

Trafficking of children for labor or sexual exploitation Estimated that 14% of registered trafficking victims in Europe are minors<sup>4</sup>

#### Origin States

- Estimated 70% of those trafficked in Europe are EU nationals<sup>9</sup>
- Eastern European countries, especially those from the former Soviet Union, are particularly vulnerable to trafficking because of their history of political unrest and high rates of poverty.

# Australia

- Human trafficking is illegal under Australia's criminal code<sup>10</sup>
- Ratified the UN Protocol to Prevent, Suppress and Punish Trafficking in Persons, especially Women and Children in 2005<sup>11</sup>
- Prostitution laws vary by territory—some states regulate sex work and brothel operations while others are more restrictive<sup>12</sup>
- The Support for Trafficked People Program<sup>13</sup>
  - Administered by the Department of Social Services
  - Delivered nationally by the Australian Red Cross.
