

If a child is under 18 and exhibits signs of trafficking, report suspicions immediately.

- **BE ALERT** during large gatherings such as conventions or sporting games
- **DO NOT** confront the child or the adult
- **ALERT** the manager on duty
- **MAKE NOTE** of date and time of suspected incident
- **REPORT** suspicions to management

WHAT TO DO

TOGETHER WE CAN DISRUPT HUMAN TRAFFICKING

Human Trafficking is a criminal activity in which human beings are exploited for another person's monetary gain. Human trafficking happens in communities all over the world. There is no one "face of human trafficking." As hospitality employees, we are the eyes and ears of the hotel.

INDICATORS

TRAFFICKER

- Pays for the room one day at a time
 - Escorts various men into the room and lingers until they leave, watching the door
 - Seen with many young women or men or children
 - Requests for isolated, private rooms, or rooms close to an exit
 - Does not leave victim alone
 - Controls all money and identification
 - Openly threatens or physically assaults the victim

VICTIM

- Dressed inappropriately for age or weather
- Fearful of authority figures, may avoid eye contact
- Does not speak freely
- Drugged, disoriented, confused, lacking sleep or showing signs of abuse
- Refers to trafficker as “Daddy”
- Not in possession of passports, or other travel or identity documents
- Has little or no luggage, wears the same attire
- Malnourished, injuries at different stages of healing, and/or lack of medical care
