

Tracker: Efforts by States to Eliminate the Exception Allowing Slavery or Involuntary Servitude as Punishment for a Crime

The <u>Thirteenth Amendment</u> to The U.S. Constitution abolishes slavery and involuntary servitude except when it is punishment for a crime. Twenty states have similar language in their Constitutions. Colorado removed the exception in 2018, Utah and Nebraska voters approved a ballot measure to remove the language in 2020, and four other states are working to eliminate it. The chart below tracks the twenty-three states and the status of their efforts to abolish slavery and involuntary servitude. This chart will be periodically updated. It was last updated November 2020.

Nebraska	There shall be neither slavery nor involuntary servitude in this state, otherwise than for the punishment of crime, whereof the party shall have been duly convicted. <u>Article</u> <u>I. Section 2</u>	Voters approved a <u>ballot</u> <u>measure</u> on Nov. 3, 2020. When it goes it effect, it will read: There shall be neither slavery nor involuntary servitude in this State.

Arkansas	There shall be no slavery in this State, nor involuntary servitude, except as a punishment for crime. <u>Article</u> <u>II, Section 27</u>	In 2019 Rep. Vivian Flowers introduced an amendment to remove the exception. It did not make it out of the legislature.
Minnesota	No member of this state shall be disfranchised or deprived of any of the rights or privileges secured to any citizen thereof, unless by the law of the land or the judgement of his peers. There shall be neither slavery nor involuntary servitude in the state, otherwise than as punishment for a crime of which the party has been convicted. <u>Article I, Section 2</u>	Senator Bobby Joe Champion introduced an <u>amendment</u> in February 2020. Awaiting further action by the legislature.
Tennessee	That slavery and involuntary servitude, except as a punishment for crime, whereof the party shall have been duly convicted, are forever prohibited in this state. <u>Article 1, Section 33</u>	Currently in the <u>legislature</u> . Passed in the 111 <sup>th</sup> session, now needs to pass in the 112 <sup>th</sup> session. If it does, it would be on the ballot in 2022
Wisconsin	There shall be neither slavery, nor involuntary servitude in this state, otherwise than for the punishment of crime, of which the party shall have been duly convicted. <u>Article</u> <u>I, section 2</u>	Rep. <u>Lena Taylor</u> advanced a bill to remove the exception for the punishment of a crime in 2016 and <u>2017</u> , it <u>failed</u> both times.
