The Global Campaign for the Prevention of Child Marriage (GCPCM)

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Child marriage is fundamental violation of human rights, which depriving children from their right to education, health and safety. The U.N. children's agency, UNICEF, estimates more than 650 million women alive today had been married off when they were before the age of 18. The statistical analysis show that If child marriage had continued, more than 150 million girls will marry by 2030. The Global Campaign for the Prevention of Child Marriage (GCPCM) was launched in March 2019, and the primary goal of this Campaign is raising awareness and illuminating people's minds to address child marriage in the world. The managers of campaign believe that education is a powerful strategy to prevent child marriage in the world. This Campaign is not a Charity or an NGO, it is just a free program available to communities to help spread awareness about child marriage and everyone who joins to this Campaign does on a voluntary basis. This Campaign has begun a global project for which is called "100 women and 100 dreams "and everyone from any country can join freely and work voluntary. In this project we invite women and the required information was collected through in-depth interviews of women who are actually involved in this phenomenon and they had married under the age of 18.





Figure 1. Nationality of the participants

The interviews were conducted from May 2019 to February, 2023. The participants from three countries (Figure 1), freely answered the questions raised during the interview and talked about their dreams for their future when they were child (they talked about their dreams before getting married).

The statistical analysis showed that, 100 married women aged 28 to 72 years (mean age of 47.18), who lived in Afghanistan, Pakistan and Iraq had married under the age of 18, were enrolled (Table 1). The mean age of first marriage among the participants was 12.11 years (the range was 8-17 years).

The participants' husbands were in the age range of 13 to 48 years (mean age was 23.46 years). The mean, standard deviation, age of participants, age of marriage for girl and men for three countries are listed in Table 2.

Analyzing the interviews demonstrated that dreams of all 100 women were shattered by getting married at a young age. Each of them had many dreams for their future when they were child, but they couldn't fulfill their dreams and they became engaged in family issues that they were not yet ready to handle. They spoke with regret about their desire to continue their education and interests.

The women spoke about their dreams when they were a child, from the earliest that they can remember, and send a united voice in the world to prevent child marriage.



In general, the results of this project indicated that early marriages (between the ages of 8 and 17) stole their childhood and shattered their dreams. Furthermore, child marriage prevented them from going to school and isolated them from their families, friends, and their communities. The children should go to school and study; they should play with their friends. Girls who are involved in child marriage frequently get pregnant when still in their teen years, increasing their risk of pregnancy or childbirth complications which sometimes can lead to death. Child marriage limits girls' opportunities and employment chances in the future, and girls who leave school have worse health and economic outcomes than those who continue their education, and eventually, their children and families fare worse as well. In other world child marriage poses a risk to their lives, the lives of their children, and the future of their communities.

In this project, women who had married under the age of 18, were enrolled and spoke about their childhood dreams, and sent a united voice in the world to prevent child marriage.
